These meetings were presented in order to provide parents and students with more information about LCAP and our school-wide goals for the 2016-2017 school year. Additionally, parents and students were invited to provide feedback and engage in discussion around bettering our programs and supports for students.

Students were surveyed during their regular appointment times through the **online assessment** platform. Through these surveys, students were again invited to provide feedback around bettering our programs and supports for students, particularly focusing on school climate and career and technical education (CTE).

Student Survey Results

Core classes

Students prefer taking core classes in the following format:

11%

SGJ class with an electronic textbook and packets (using their own device or a device provided by OFL.)

28%

SGJ classes with a traditional textbook and paper packets.

17%

A combination of online learning and small group instruction with an electronic textbook and packets (using their own device or a device provided by OFL.)

13%

Independent study class with an electronic textbook and packets (using their own device or a device provided by OFL.)

31%

Independent study class with a traditional textbook and paper packets.

60%

of students students are either somewhat likely or very likely to take job skills courses at OFL if they were offered.

An additional **9%** of students indicated that they would likely take job skill courses if they were able to receive a skills certification upon completion.

Students were asked to rank how satisfied they are with their experience at OFL on a scale of 1-5, average ranking was:

When asked what their immediate plans are for after graduation (within 1 year), students responded the following way:

11%

of students said they plan to travel or join the military.

28%

of students said they plan to attend a 4 year college.

10%

of students said they don't plan to go to college, just full or part time work.

36%

of students said they plan to attend community college.

OFL is currently developing an Early College program that will allow for dual enrollment in courses that students can receive college credit for while in high school.

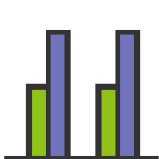
OFL is currently developing a partnership with Pathways College that will aid students in gaining access to an affordable 4 year degree.
